A J.D. for Jodi: Schoolcraft Laid the Foundation for a Legal Career

When I was in third grade, I loved to give speeches in front of class. I nominated myself for every class office and eventually even made it to "Board Eraser." My teacher, Mr. Hayman, said, "I bet you'll be a lawyer when you grow up." Being young and ignorant of my family's financial state and the resources required to obtain a legal degree, I replied, "I bet you're right."

In high school government class, I also enjoyed giving speeches and raising a ruckus. My teacher's response, "You would make a great lawyer." By that time, I wanted him to be right, but I was aware of my family's depressed financial condition. College, let alone law school, was an unlikely prospect.

My fortune changed when, in 1999-2000, I became the features editor of the Schoolcraft Connection. I would write articles ranging from fluffy holiday pieces, columns on noisy babies, to the 2000 presidential elections. In return, I received a scholarship for tuition. I earned enough credits to transfer to Michigan State University. More importantly, my experience at Schoolcraft gave me the confidence to think bigger. If it was possible to earn tuition doing what I loved, I knew it was also possible that I could be a lawyer.

Morphing that confidence with hard work, I graduated from Cooley Law School. In my first five years of practice, I briefed cases in the Michigan and United States Supreme Courts and was named one of the Top 5 lawyers under 35 by the Ingham County Bar Association.

Without my experience at Schoolcraft, it is unlikely that I would have followed my dream of becoming a lawyer. I would have succumbed to the mantra ingrained in my teenage brain, "only rich kids become lawyers."
