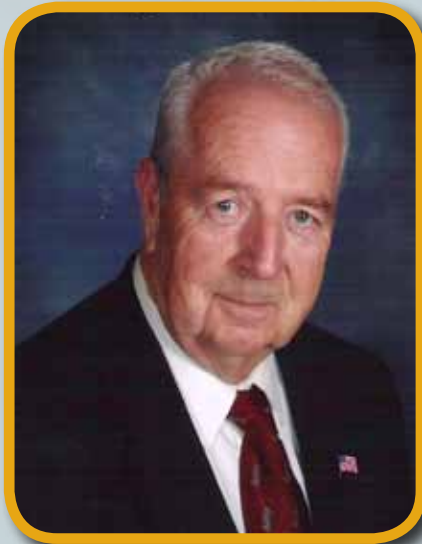

A Chance

I graduated from Schoolcraft College in 1967 with an associate degree in architecture, but my relationship with SC actually started before I even enrolled as a student. I graduated from Thurston High School in 1964 and must admit that I was a very poor student.

After high school graduation I went to work in a small factory. However, after suffering a very serious accident at the factory I decided not to continue my employment. I decided instead that I wanted to go back to school. I applied to Schoolcraft College. I took the entrance exam and failed.

I then requested, and was granted, an appointment with Dean Lois Waterman. I asked her what I could do to gain admission into the school. She told me to take algebra and English composition courses at one of the high schools and return to her with a grade of "B" or better and she would reconsider my admission.

Consequently, I went back to high school and took the courses she recommended and if memory serves me correctly I received an "A" and "B." When I returned to Dean Waterman she showed me where she had written in my folder that if I attended the two classes and returned to her with the appropriate grades she would let me into the school on probation. She warned me that day that I must never fall below a 2.5 GPA. I believe that I graduated with a 3.4 average.

Following graduation from SC, I went to work immediately for Chatham Super Markets as their first architectural draftsman. During 1968 I was married and drafted into the army. After three years in the service I returned to Chatham Super Markets and served as a maintenance dispatcher, maintenance supervisor, construction supervisor, and construction engineer.

In 1983 I joined Great Scott Supermarkets as the director of construction and served in that capacity for seven years. In 1990, I was recruited by A&P (The Great Atlantic and Pacific Tea Co.) as their director of construction for Farmer Jack Super Markets. During my 14 years with A&P I was promoted to national director of construction and vice president of construction. I retired in 2004.

I attribute much of my success during my career to the education I received at Schoolcraft College.
