
Emilio Di Concilio Class of 1974

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Living Semper Altius Aspice

My name is Emilio Di Concilio. I graduated in 1974 from School-craft College with an associate degree in general studies. Although I am an American citizen, I am also a product of southern Italy where I studied in my hometown of Prignano Cilento until the eighth grade and then in Milano in northern Italy for my first year of high school.

I emigrated to the United States of America in 1969 and I attended one year of high school in Dearborn Heights, Michigan. I received an honorary high school diploma in June 1970.

I applied to Schoolcraft College that year and after taking the ACT test I was admitted for the fall semester of 1970. Schoolcraft College opened up the doors of higher education to me. I studied, worked outside of campus, and participated in a variety of college activities.

My studies and activities enriched my life and motivated me to pursue a bachelor's degree at the University of Michigan. I graduated in 1976 with a Bachelor of Arts degree in sociology and psychology. I continued my education by pursuing a teaching certificate in the social sciences, which I received in 1979. I taught for a year in the Detroit Public Schools and in the fall of 1980, I returned to Italy where I lived for three years.

I eventually returned to the United States, renewed my teaching certificate and began substitute teaching at Bishop Borgess High School, where I had done my student teaching, and then in the Garden City Public Schools where I remained for four years before returning again to Italy in 1987.

Returning to the states in 1988, I again renewed my certificate and I worked for three different schools during the school years of 1988-1990.

In 1990, my life took a different course when I obtained some full-time positions outside of teaching. Eventually I was promoted to an executive position. I worked in the mental health field, but returned to teaching in 1998. I began to teach Italian language, grammar, culture and conversation, and also taught business in translations and interpretations. I taught and translated-interpreted from 2000-2010 while at the same time I and attended Wayne State University. I received a Master of Arts degree in romance languages with a major in Italian.

Today, I am 58 years old, retired and doing the best I can. I wrote this essay to let you know that Schoolcraft College allowed me to look "Ever Upward" with its motto "Semper Altius Aspices." While there, I had instructors and professors that believed in the enrichment of student lives as a means of improving society and the betterment of individuals.
